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## From taking flight to taking the stage, Sunwing Travel Group President & Founder **Colin Hunter** brings passion to everything under the sun.

caught up with Colin Hunter a few hours before he took the stage at the House of Jazz in Laval, Quebec. Throughout our interview, the octogenarian crooner with a keen eye and entrepreneurial spirit detailed the events that paved the way for his biggest success: the launch of Sunwing.

#### Work your way up

But who was Colin Hunter before becoming one of the major players in the Canadian travel industry? Born in Bombay (now Mumbai) to a military father, Hunter's family later settled in London, England, where the aspiring businessman adapted to life in the British capital.

"When I lived in London in the 1960s, I worked at the British Airways control center," Hunter recalls. "In fact, I had three jobs: I went to school at night and was also a bartender at the Hammersmith Palais on the weekends. I loved being busy!"

With a stoicism reflecting his English education, Hunter says that he doesn't understand – and is a little humbled by – the travel industry's interest in his story.

"Sometimes I feel like I've said everything, but it's true that I do not often talk about my life as such. I prefer to talk business ... or music!" he exclaims.

A young Hunter was able to fuel his interest in travel by taking advantage of his role at a global carrier. It's how he landed in Canada in 1970, with a head full of projects fuelled by a fascination for aviation.

Shortly after arriving in Canada, Hunter was quickly hired by now-defunct tour operator Sunflight.

I always said that I was going to start my own airline... but I imagined I would have one or two aircraft, not an entire fleet!



"I started at the reservations centre," Hunter tells *PAX*. "I was paid \$95 a week at the time! I gradually climbed the ladder until I became vice-president of airport negotiations a few years later."

This marked Hunter's entry into the higher echelons of Canadian aviation.

In 1983, he became CEO of the Canadian subsidiary of Adventure Tours in Toronto but, toward the end of the decade, the tour operator's airline partners ceased to

offer charter flights. Hunter quickly saw an opportunity.

"That's when I thought 'why not start your own airline and run your own fleet?' I didn't like the idea of depending on others to work."

Thus was born Canada 3000, which Hunter operated in collaboration with Robert Deluce (who would later launch Porter Airlines) until 1995.

Travel: we either have it in our blood or we do not have it at all.

"Our inaugural flight took place on Nov. 16, 1988 on a Boeing 757," he recalls. "What allowed us to create a carrier from scratch in just four months was mainly the fact that the regulations were not as complex as they are today."

Following his departure from Canada 3000 in 1995 (the airline would later collapse in the wake of Sept. 11, 2001), Hunter–then at the dawn of his 60s – had seemingly retired from travel. But it didn't last long.

"After four years, my wife begged me to go back to work!" he jokes.

And just a few years later in 2002, the Sunwing Travel Group began to take shape.

#### September 11: a turning point for the industry

Hunter argues that this unfortunate date was a turning point in aviation – not just in the management of ground and air safety, but because many companies went out of business, clearing the way for new players to carve out a place in a oncesaturated market.

"In my case, it was after the upheavals of Sept. 11 that I seized my opportunity. I was lucky enough to take advantage of a dip in the market."

A very modest statement from one who not only founded one of the carriers that would become a staple of the Canadian travel industry, but which also revolutionized it; for Canadians, the south is now more accessible than ever before.

When asked what he would do differently if founding a vertically-integrated carrier in 2019 rather than at the turn of the millennium, he replied:

"I quickly realized that we could not do the same thing as in the 80s and 90s. The main difference is that in order to be a viable airline today, you really need to create a highly-innovative product, something never before seen."

#### Once a traveller...

Without his role at British Airways and the horizons it opened, would Hunter have had the same destiny?

"If I didn't take advantage of my employee privileges to travel, and eventually discover Canada where I met my wife, who knows if I would still be in this industry. I might never have left London!" he jokes.

Looking back over his long travel career, it seems unlikely that he would have gone in a different direction while equipped with such an entrepreneurial spirit. →

It is no longer possible to simply copy; you have to do a lot better than what already exists.





#### Entrepreneurship s according to Colin Hunter

With 40 years of travel experience spanning two continents, what advice does Hunter have for those looking to forge a career path in this industry?


"I would never dare to be as cheeky as to advise someone on anything! I don't see the future and circumstances can change so quickly," he says.

However, he goes on to say that a golden opportunity is never visible to just one person: if there is a gap in the market or a major development opportunity, the key to success is simply to take action before someone else does.

"You just have to know how to act at the right moment, because otherwise there will be too many players vying for the same piece of pie," he says, adding "that there is no standard model - otherwise, everyone in the whole world would just do the same thing."

According to Hunter, even if a project is deployed at a time when less than 100 per cent of the conditions for success are met, it's not a guarantee of failure as perfection does not exist.

"Some risks turn into failures, while others do not, for a variety of reasons which are sometimes even totally out of our control. This is the essence of every business. All of this is only a large sequence of calculated risks."



Every moment presents unique opportunities. But in any case, there is no guarantee of success.

"Once you have both feet in the travel industry, it's practically inconceivable to turn around and go elsewhere despite the challenges, such as hurricanes or strikes or anything else," Hunter says. "In the end, it's a real passion, even if it's business."

How does the owner of one of Canada's major tour operators travel? Hunter admits that he never draws attention to himself when flying with Sunwing and does not ask for privileged treatment, preferring to observe with a keen eye the passengers and crew in complete anonymity.

And while his career path has led him to specialize in Caribbean destinations, it was a world tour aboard an aircraft chartered by National Geographic in 2006 that made a lasting impact on him.

"We started in Washington, then travelled to Machu Picchu, Easter Island, American Samoa, Australia, Southeast Asia, Japan, China, India, and finally, Kenya and Egypt ... all in just 21 days! It was incredible. My favourite destination is in the South Pacific. I love Tahiti!" he recalls, smiling.

Maybe the next international destination served by Sunwing?

"I would like to be able to announce it, but it's a little far!" he laughs. ●





An accomplished musician with 12 studio albums of jazz standards and the proud owner of Toronto's Jazz Bistro, Hunter doesn't just operate an airline ... he also takes care of the entertainment on board! Some of his hits are indeed heard on Sunwing flights.

"I've been a singer from a very young age; as a teenager, I sang on Indian radio in exchange for a handful of rupees. I'm from the Sinatra generation; (Tony) Bennett and (Louis) Armstrong, these are the artists I grew up with."

Despite this, Hunter says he still prefers revising columns of numbers and developing new air links to the idea of appearing on stage daily.

"It's not something I want to do every day; I want it to remain special to me. It's a small privilege."

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

# for sun destinations

While a sun holiday is all about relaxation, it's possible to be too relaxed while soaking up the sun.

Each destination has its own customs and laws and it can be easy to inadvertently make a mistake, even for seasoned travellers. In addition, travellers staying at resorts can sometimes be unsure of how much – or who – to tip, or if the practice is even accepted at a particular property.

As your clients prepare to head south this winter, here's some handy travelling tips they can pack with their sunglasses and swimsuits.



Unsure about how much to tip at the resort? In the Caribbean, use the following guidelines: \$1 per bag for bag attendants; \$1-\$2 per couple for shuttle drivers; \$5 per day for housekeeping staff (be sure to tip daily as you won't have the same housekeepers each day!); \$1-\$2 per group drink order for bartenders; \$5 per couple for tour guides.



Even if gratuities are already included in the price of your resort stay, extra tipping can help secure exceptional service. However, be sure to know the tipping policy of your resort, as some properties do not permit staff to accept tips. In that case, compliment a staff member who did an outstanding job – management takes notice and it will likely help them progress in their career!



While small gifts left for resort staff – items such as candy or plush toys – are certainly appreciated, a cash tip for great service is much more useful to hospitality workers. Plus it's easier to pack! If you want to say thanks with a tangible gift, consider donating through a charitable organization like Pack For A Purpose, which allows travellers to donate needed items to schools and community groups in various destinations.

Pack the swimwear for the pool or the beach, but if you'regoing into town, be sure to put your clothes back on: it's considered rude in many countries to wear a bathing suit outside of the water.

If you're travelling to the Caribbean, leave the camouflage clothing at home, as it's illegal for civilians to wear camo patterns in the following destinations: Antigua and Barbuda; Bahamas; Barbados; Dominica; Grenada; Jamaica; Saint Lucia; Saint Vincent and the Grenadines; and Trinidad & Tobago.

When buying sunscreen for your trip, consider a product free from oxybenzone and octinoxate, as the two chemicals are known to harm coral reefs and aquatic life. Sunscreens containing these chemicals have been banned in Bonaire and Key West as well as parts of Mexico, particularly regions containing ecologically-sensitive waterbodies such as cenotes.



Leave the weed at home: while cannabis may now be legal in Canada, it's still illegal to transport across international borders, such as through air travel. In addition, cannabis remains a controlled substance in many other destinations, including most of the Caribbean, so if you don't know the local laws, don't partake while travelling.

Your waiter in Mexico won't bring you the cheque until you're ready – it would be considered rude! You'll have to make the request yourself: "la cuenta, por favor."





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

# What's rewarder the sun?

ore and more Canadians are heading south each year for the sun and sand of the Caribbean and increasingly, they're looking for unique experiences beyond the typical all-inclusive.

And while some destinations continue to rebuild following 2017's record hurricane season, last year's travel statistics indicate visitors – Canadians in particular – haven't been deterred from exploring islands both familiar and undiscovered.

Nancy Drolet, the Caribbean Tourism Organization's business development representative for Canada, notes that while Canadian visitation figures for islands such as Anguilla, St. Martin/St. Maarten →



and Dominica – three destinations among the hardest hit during 2017's hurricane season – continue to slowly rebound, there were a number of "good news stories" in 2018. Among them were the following:

- Antigua & Barbuda up 66 per cent in year-overyear arrivals from January to December 2018, partly attributable to an additional Sunwing flight out of Montreal.
- Grenada up 19.1 per cent and a further 36.1 per cent between January and March 2019; that number will likely increase in 2019 with the return of Sunwing's service this winter.
- St. Vincent & The Grenadines up 13 per cent, due to the addition of a second Air Canada flight for high season.
- Curacao up 10.6 per cent in 2018, followed by an 18.7 per cent increase from January to March, assisted by the addition of a second Air Canada flight from Montreal.

#### Authenticity is key

With several of these destinations among the region's rising tourism stars, these increasing arrivals also point to a growing demand amongst Canadian travellers →





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for an authentic Caribbean experience, a vacation in which the sights, sounds and tastes have not been filtered through the lens of the all-inclusive resort.

"People are looking for authenticity worldwide – they want to see how the locals live, to go into the local bars and restaurants," Drolet says, adding that the trend is a timely one as the CTO declared 2019 as the Caribbean's Year of Festivals and Events. "People are going and joining in (the festivities), which speaks to that drive."

In an effort to assist travel advisors, Drolet notes that the CTO has included a detailed calendar of events for every island at OneCaribbean.org, a resource that can come in handy for agents booking affinity groups.

"We're encouraging the retail agents to build group departures around these events," Drolet explains. "For example, if you have a group that likes to visit the Montreal Jazz Festival, maybe they'd be interested in attending the Saint Lucia Jazz Festival instead."

#### All in the family

Groups are also at the heart of a growing number of multigen travellers, which Drolet says are increasingly seeking out villa stays over traditional resorts and hotels, as a way to enjoy a more cost-effective family vacation. According to Drolet, destinations such as Jamaica, Barbados and Nevis are among the Caribbean's top spots for villas and with these types of stays on the rise, the CTO is helping to further educate travel agents on this growing sector.

"One of the things we'll be doing is providing more training for travel agents so they can learn how to cost it out as a viable option for their clients," she says. "The villa product in the Caribbean represents such a wide range of destinations and costs, so I think for agents, understanding what can be added or removed to a villa stay to tailor it to their client is the most important point."

#### Climate change: facing the future

With the memory of 2017 still fresh in mind, Drolet says that the CTO and its member destinations continue to tackle the issue of climate change head on, citing a growing number of conference calls and webinars designed to allow member destinations to share their best practices.

She points to the example of Dominica, which in 2017, took a direct hit from Hurricane Maria. Following the disaster, Dominica's government took action and relocated some of the island's population from the shore to higher ground and built homes that abide by the WHO's Building Back Better code.

Paraphrasing Dominica's Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit, Drolet says "we can't build back assuming it will only be a Category One storm – we have to plan for Category Five.

"We know that we're a region dependant entirely on tourism, so it's definitely a requirement." ●







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# ANTIGUA & BARBUDA reach the beach

amous for its 365 beaches – one for every day of the year! – sunand-sand seeking travellers will be right at home in Antigua & Barbuda. However, for the first-time visitor, where does one begin?


#### Beaches 101

On Antigua's western shores, some of the more popular beaches include Fort James Beach, Dickenson Bay, Galley Bay, Ffryes Beach, Darkwood Beach, Turners Beach and Morris Bay. On the east side, travellers can check out hot spots such as Half Moon Bay and Long Bay.

Not to be outdone, Barbuda also offers many pink sand beaches, which are covered in an abundance of pink shells from October to May; this phenomenon is particularly noticeable on the beaches of Low Bay and Palmetto Point from November to April. As an added bonus, Barbuda's beaches are often less crowded due to the island's smaller population.

#### Unique features

English Harbour: Historically the site of a British Royal Navy station (established under the famed Captain Horatio Nelson), English Harbour is an iconic spot in Antigua, known for yachting and the incredible views from the nearby Shirley Heights lookout point.



**Devil's Bridge:** This natural rock arch on the eastern edge of Antigua is punctuated by numerous holes, where seawater jets upward as its pushed by waves off the Atlantic Ocean.

**Darby's Cave:** A large sinkhole in Barbuda, measuring approximately 350 feet in diameter and 70 feet deep, which contains a small but lush rainforest.

Indian Cave: Located at Two Foot Bay the caves have several chambers where bays can be found hanging and small Amerindian petroglyphs (rock carvings) can be seen.

#### Island hopping

In addition to the two main islands, there's also several smaller islands which can be explored by travellers. These include such colourfully named landmasses as Great Bird Island, Prickly Pear Island, Rabbit Island, Hells Gate and Long Island, home to the exclusive Jumby Bay Resort and Vacation Homes.

#### Where to stay

Some resorts of note include the new Royalton Antigua, the Pineapple Beach Club, the Blue Waters Resort & Spa and Cocobay Resort.

#### Getting there

Air Canada and WestJet offer direct service from Toronto, while the island can also be accessed by Sunwing and Caribbean Airlines. To reach Barbuda, travellers can transfer with BMN Air or charter a private helicopter ride with Caribbean Helicopters for the 15-minute flight between islands.

Transportation is also available by sea aboard the Barbuda Express or the Lady Caroline Barbuda Ferry (the latter vessel operates Monday to Saturday). Ferry service from Antigua to Barbuda is an approximately 90-minute trip. ●



#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

- All beaches in Antigua are open to the public.
- Want to rent a car in Antigua & Barbuda? In addition to a valid driver's licence, a special permit is required. The permit which can be obtained from either the Antigua and Barbuda Transport Board or the Licence Office in Barbuda is approximately \$20 USD and is valid for three months.
- Unsure of how to pronounce 'Antigua & Barbuda?' The official pronunciation is 'An-tee-ga and Bar-byew-da.'

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


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

ou know those busy streets we think of when someone mentions Cuba, or more specifically, Havana? That scene was exactly what I experienced, and where I had the chance to stay during my last visit to Cuban capital.

The Grand Packard Hotel is where I unpacked my bags for a week under the warm Caribbean sun. The high-luxury property is the brand's very first "Grand" category product to open in Havana, with the precise goal to attract and please sunseekers who come to Cuba with the highest expectations.

The hotel even offers a Star Prestige service, which grants its most distinguished clients access to private, exclusive areas and late departure at no additional cost. Ever so lucky, I was even able to pick a pillow of

A gym with state-of-the-art equipment, in addition to several fitness classes taught by coaches, is also offered to hotel guests.


#### The hotel's food offer

Forget the stress of trying to find a new restaurant in town to eat at every night; everything your clients will need is directly available at the hotel.  $\rightarrow$ 





## The rise of MTCE groups at Sandals Resorts

oneymooners and romance have long been synonymous with Sandals Resorts.

However, one of the most commonly misunderstood aspects of the all-inclusive chain is its versatility in today's MICE and groups market.

"One of the biggest misconceptions is that we don't do groups," Grant Lawlor, national groups manager at Unique Vacations Canada, the marketing arm of Sandals Resorts, tells *PAX*. "It's a growing network for us out of Canada, especially over the past five years."

Sandals Montego Bay opened a conference centre just last year while Sandals Grenada, too, has recently expanded its conference and meeting amenities.

PAX recently had the opportunity to learn more about MICE and groups business at Sandals on a press trip at Sandals South Coast in Jamaica.

Located in rustic White House, Jamaica, the resort features three unique European villages, nine restaurants, an over-the-water bar, chapel and bungalows, a spa, and tennis, pickleball and fitness facilities, all of which connect to a two-mile stretch of serene beachfront.



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All rooms face the ocean. There's even a ballroom that can be divided into three sections, if need be, which can serve as a private check-in area for large groups.

"Sandals South Coast was built from the ground up with groups in mind," Lawlor told *PAX* on the trip. "There's consistency in room accommodations, which is important to groups and MICE planners."

The value in booking MICE groups at Sandals lies within the many concessions that come with a Sandals' all-inclusive package.

These include complimentary private check-in spaces, beverages upon arrival, meeting rooms, transfers, WiFi, basic audio and visual set-ups, coffee break spreads, one private cocktail reception (one hour), one private group dinner (two hours) and more.

"This can add up to thousands of dollars at other resorts," Lawlor said.

Groups can also schedule a giveback day at a local school, for example, with the help of The Sandals Foundation, the philanthropic arm of Sandals Resorts.

Sandals has 12 properties geared towards the MICE market. However, the makeup of a group may determine which Sandals resort is the best fit.

Sandals is geared towards couples (rooms come with one kingsized bed), so determining the group dynamic, in advance, is key.

"If you were looking for an all-singles group of all men, in the middle of February, we're not going to do it out of respect for the honeymooners," Lawlor said. "But if you were looking at the fall, let's talk about it."

Singles-only groups may be better suited at Beaches Turks and Caicos, the family-friendly arm of Sandals. Key West Village – one of five villages at the resort – has an adult vibe, if that's what a group is looking for, Lawlor noted.

"We're not only about weddings and romantic getaways anymore," Lawlor said. "There's so much more to Sandals." ■

### Healing Natural Springs, Therapeutic Baths and Oceanside Relaxation Await

The hotel allows visitors to privately enjoy the therapeutic virtues of the bath, in exclusively assigned bath houses.

#### TAKE A SOOTHING DIP AT ROCKFORT MINERAL BATH

Nestled in the ruins of Rockfort just on the outskirts of Kingston, the Rockfort Mineral Bath is fed by a cold spring from the Rock River, and was first discovered in 1907. Highly sought after by locals and visitors alike, the waters at Rockfort are radioactive





and rich in minerals including calcium and sodium bicarbonate. These minerals along with its saline content are said to stimulate vital bodily processes such as blood circulation.

#### **SOAK IN THE HEALING WATERS OF BATH FOUNTAIN**

Bath Fountain, located in the foothills of the John Crow mountains in the St. Thomas parish, has been a popular destination for naturists since its discovery in the 17th century. Its two springs, one cold and one piping hot, contain lime, sulfur and magnesium – giving it the healing properties. The waters are said to aid in the treatment of many ailments including gout, rheumatism and skin conditions. At the nearby Bath Fountain Hotel, a secluded 16-room property, visitors enjoy convenient access to running water from the mineral springs which feed directly into the hotel's indoor baths.

#### REFRESH WITH A TRADITIONAL JAMAICAN BUSH BATH

A traditional form of healing ailments in Jamaican culture, a bush bath is a must-try treatment for wellness-driven travelers. Often prepared outdoors, a bush bath can utilize a variety of fresh herbs, roots, leaves and fruits, steeped in a running bath to treat stress, common colds, skin conditions and more. Visitors can experience

this homeopathic therapy at various spas throughout the island including Fern Tree Spa at Half Moon or FieldSpa at Golden Eye, which offers four different Healing Waters Bush Baths.

#### **CHECK-IN FOR AN OCEANFRONT WELLNESS RETREAT.**

On Negril's west end, Jackie's On The Reef provides a wellness retreat dedicated to nurturing the mind, body and soul. One of its most notable offerings, the Watsu treatment, combines the use of water with the principles of shiatsu to create a nurturing form of bodywork. Guided by a specialized therapist, the treatment takes place in warm, waist-deep water to take weight off the vertebrae, allowing the spine to twist and stretch – ultimately relieving pressure off the nerves and organs.



## 5 REALLY GOOD REASONS to go to Guadeloupe

PAX was on location in Guadeloupe to criss-cross three of the five different islands that make up this French archipelago. Here are five good reasons to head on over to this little piece of the French Caribbean!

Sable white, yellow, orange or black, the beaches of the islands of Guadeloupe are diverse and incredibly beautiful. Travellers might not find kilometre-long stretches of beach, like in Cuba or the Dominican Republic, but

they'll come across enchanting wild coves,

On the volcanic island of Basse-Terre, the tumultuous past of the Soufriere volcano explains the many black and yellow sand beaches. On Grande-Terre and Marie-Galante, the white sand beaches are lined with warm and crystalline water and a handful of restaurants.





Moreover, the island of Basse-Terre is home to the Guadeloupe National Park, a dense tropical jungle and a network of more than 300 kilometres of trails. This island is also known for its many waterfalls, such as the Acomat Jump and the Crayfish Waterfall. To reach them, you'll have to hike (the first trail is quite steep, the second is very accessible).


At the base of Creole cuisine, there's a lot of spices, which we can also buy at the market of Sainte-Anne, at the edge of the beach.

"We Guadeloupeans, we like to eat! Moreover, everything we eat is fresh," says Déborah Coffre, mission manager for Travel Agencies and TO for the Tourism Committee of the Guadeloupe Islands in Canada, based in Montreal.



At the Marché de Sainte-Anne, tourists can buy spices found in typical Creole dishes such as Colombo de Cabri (an Indian curry of goat cheese), the fierce avocado (a mixture of avocado, flour of cassava and cod, sprinkled with chili) or a good grilled fish with pumpkin rice.

The Ti-Punch and the Planter are two local drinks made with Guadeloupe rum, and are a must-try for any visitor. The locals each have their own personal way to prepare them. →





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#### Accommodations for every budget

On the five islands, there is a place to stay for everybody. Properties range from charming hotels, like the four-star Relais du Moulin, to a few all-inclusives, such as Club Med La Caravelle, to homestays.

We were able to try three different gites (holiday homes for rent) and we were very satisfied with the quality of the accommodation. From a modern villa, to a typical Guadeloupean house or village bungalow, the different choices allow vacationers to enjoy their own rental house.


Travellers to Guadeloupe are able to visit cultural landmarks that pay tribute to the island's former colonial history. At the ACTe Memorial (Center for the Expression and Memory of Trafficking

and Slavery) in Pointe-à-Pitre, visitors can learn more about the presence of slavery in Guadeloupe.

Other landmarks include, in Marie-Galante, the Habitation Murat, a well-preserved example of a mansion, a mill and a sugar cane plantation.





#### **..... USEFUL INFORMATION ......**

Getting there: two airlines, Air Canada and Air Transat, offer flights to Guadeloupe via Montreal – note that there are no direct flights from Toronto. Air Canada services the island yearround, with two weekly flights in low season, three weekly flights in shoulder season, and four weekly flights in high season. Air Transat, on the other hand, offers seasonal flights from mid-December to March.

**Currency:** the islands of Guadeloupe are a French territory and operate with euros.

Getting around: the best way to fully explore both Grande-Terre and Basse-Terre islands is by hiring a car. The major brands (Hertz, Budget, Avis, etc.) are located at the airport Guadeloupe – Pôle Caraïbes, on Grande-Terre. Ferry services, such as L'Express des Iles, offer regular links to islands like Marie-Galante and Saintes.



Climate: the archipelago is blessed with a tropical climate, with average temperatures between 20 and 30 Celsius. The dry season is from January to June, while wet season, which also coincides with hurricane season, is from July to December.







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
